

## Did You Know?

The sheep was one of the first animals domesticated by prehistoric humans in the Middle East around 9000 years ago.

The wild sheep had a coat that had both hair and wool fibres, which provided warmth, insulation and weather resistance and which was moulted in the spring. This discarded fibre would have been gathered, spun and woven into cloth, leading to the development of a textile industry around 10,000-8,000 BC.

Over the centuries the sheep has also been used to provide milk and in many parts of the world the sheep is still milked, and the milk used for drinking, butter and cheese.

In the sheep's history it has been modified with selective breeding to enhance desirable characteristics of wool fibre, meat quality and milk production, resulting in the near extinction of ancient breeds.
