All prices lifted on last sale one month ago. Domestic processors paid out to 440c/kg on well finished Vealer Steers. Cows also finished dearer, up to 20c/kg across the board. Heifers averaged out to \$1,233/head while the Steer portion averaged at \$1,506.91/head
